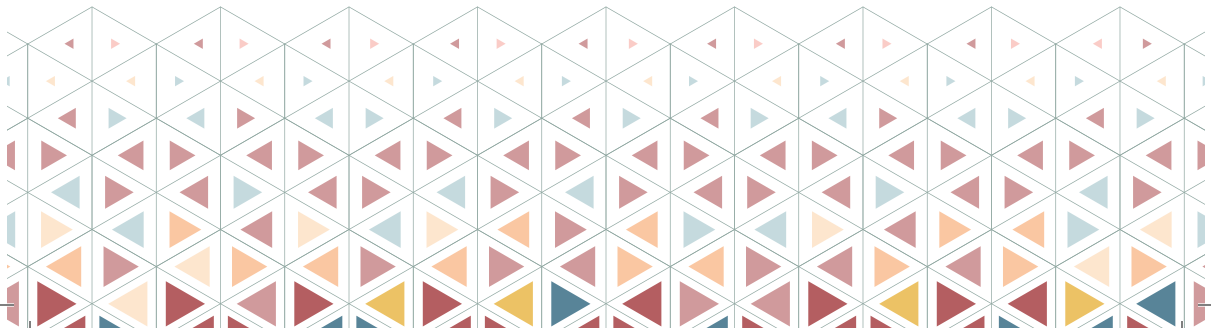

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About Us

The Global Programme for Women's Leadership (GPWL), 2019 is a global platform created to bring together young women leaders and harness their collective potential to solve the world's most pressing challenges, especially in the fields of healthcare, sustainability and technology.

The first-ever edition of the programme in April 2019 will include a series of events including discussions, field trips, mentoring, training and cultural immersion activities to provide authentic exposure to young women and prepare them for impactful leadership positions. They will have the opportunity to interact with global leaders and industry experts in their fields.

This conference will bring together 90 young and bright women leaders from India, Africa and the Bay of Bengal Community from diverse backgrounds in law, medical sciences, economics, humanities, health, environment, communications and gender to discuss challenges, issues and opportunities in the healthcare, sustainability and technology sectors.

The objectives are three-fold:

- Gender equality in its truest sense given that women represent half the world
- Practicable solutions to pressing challenges that impact women disproportionately
- Connectedness across the globe – focus on the 'Commonwealth'

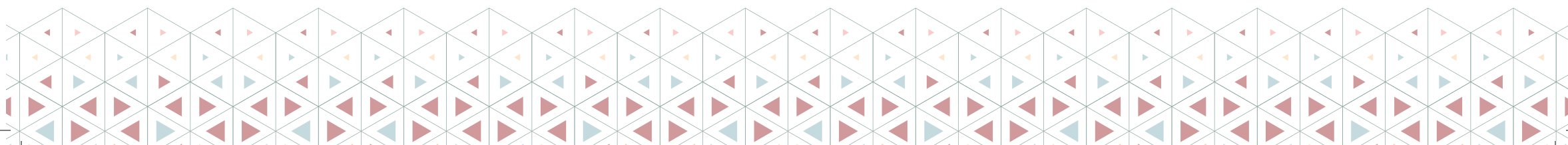

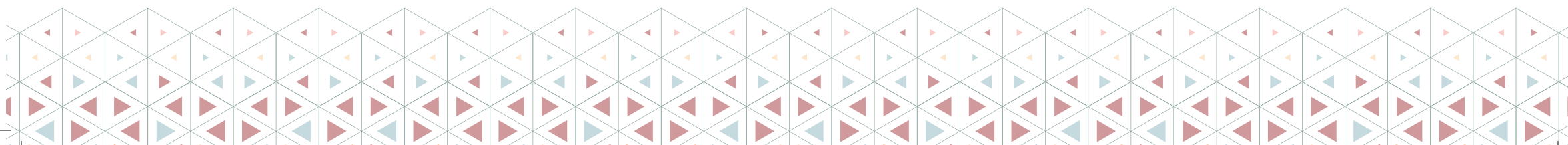

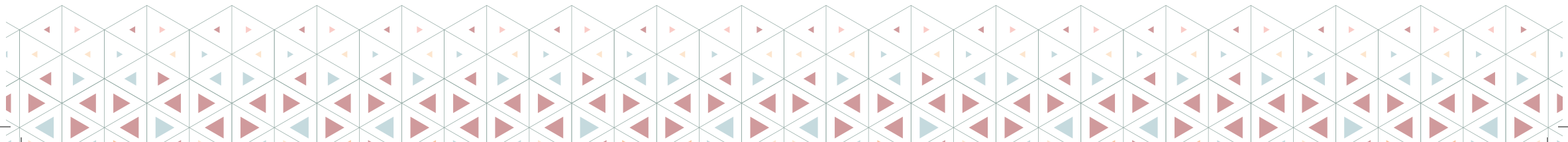
